

## **USS GRIDLEY (DLG-21)**

"FIRE WHEN READY GRIDLEY"



USS GRIDLEY (DLG-21) is the third ship of the fleet to be named in honor of Captain Charles V. GRIDLEY, U. S. Navy. Captain GRIDLEY distinguished himself in the Battle of Manila Bay as the Commanding Officer of Admiral DEWEY's (Raghio Olympia. The first GRIDLEY, (DD-29) a Torpedo Bost Destroyer, was launched on 4 July 1918. This GRIDLEY served in the Atlantic Fleet until 1922 when set was decommissioned. The second GRIDLEY (Dn-29) was launched on 1 December 1938. This destroyer served during World War II in the Pacific and distinguished herself in many campaigns for which she carned it buttle stars and the Philippine Republic Presidential Unit Citation Badge. GRIDLEY was decommissioned in the Pearl Introor Navy Yard on 18 April 1946.

The third GRIMLEY (DLG-21) was build at the Puget Sound Bridge and Dry Dock Company at Seattle, Washington, Her keel was laid 15 July 1960 and she was launched 31 July 1961 under the sponsorship of Mrs. Stuart D. Rose, great-granddaughter of Captain Charles Vernon GRIDLEY, U.S. Navy.

GRIDLEY has a length of 533 feet; extreme beam of 53 feet; normal displacement of 7,400 tons; designed speed in excess of 36 tonts and a designed complement of 389 officers and men. Her armament consists of two twin TERRIER surface to air missiles. Anti-Submarine Eockets (ASROC), two triple torpodo mounts and two twin 5°/39 rapid fire guns.

GRIDLEY was delivered to the P. S. Navy at the Paget Sound Naval Shippard, Bromerica, Washington on 30 April 1963 and was placed in commission on 25 May 1963, Captain Percy A. LiLLY, Jr., U. S. Navy in Command.

The pilot, expoliot, air crew and ground crew performed to an outstanding manner during all of Gridley's patrols. They were constantly on the alert, posed for action, and they contributed significantly to the Search and Rescue effort in the Odif, LCDR, Brecka, ENS, McMinn and several of the crew members were cited and given medals by both the United States and South Vetenamese governments for heroism under fire while on several rescue missions. They also performed yoman service in transporting the Chaplain to other ships in the area for Stadey cherch services and in carrying members of Gridley's Medical Department to another ship hit by Viet Cong gunfire and baddy in need of medical assistance, the control of the Congress of the Cong
