Message from the President:

Dear Plank Owners.

On behalf of our Board of Directors, I would like to thank you for the support you've provided during our formative period. Your generosity has enabled us to have our accession procedures in place before issuing a call for artifacts and this is something every Curator we've spoken with has advised us to do. Specifically, we've completed a state of the art computerized bar coding system that will provide instant information on each article as to donor, storage

identification, historical significance, etc.. Invaluable assistance from a local expert who became interested in what we are doing to perpetuate the legacy of the Naval Helicopter also helped make this possible.

Our next requirement is for storage. To that end, we've established liaison with USS Midway and have been assured of space aboard. According to her web site, http://www.midway.org/, July 4, 2000 is the scheduled date for her grand opening at the embarcadero in San Diego and we hope to establish a strong presence for the rotary wing community. In the meantime, we're operating out of a space at North Island and we have applied as a non-profit organization for any other suitable sites that may exist.

Our Plank Owner roster now numbers <u>133</u> members and the names include many distinguished individuals from the active duty, retired and civilian communities. I invite you to read through the list. If your name is among them, I believe you'll be proud to number yourself among such a sterling group. If you're not a Plank Owner, we hope you'll join us. Mark Starr Pioneer Award – 1999:

(The following remarks were made during the presentation of the award.)

The MARK STARR PIONEER AWARD for 1999 is being awarded to all Navy/Marine and civilian personnel who served in support of naval helicopter operations in the Korean Conflict during the period 27 June 1950 to 27 July 1954. This includes the pilots, crew chiefs, air crew, corpsmen, maintenance and administrative personnel, civilian technical representatives, and other support personnel who were stationed in Korea, with 7th Fleet ships off shore and in maintenance and supply/support units in Japan.

Starting with a blank page these people wrote Naval Helicopter History as they developed and refined the many missions that were laid on the helicopter. These included plane guard, ditched pilot recovery, combat SAR, gunnery spotting, mail and supply runs to non-aviation ships and mountain peak outposts, medevac (combat & non-combat), holy helo, and mine spotting and destruction. For the first time complete units, up to and including a whole battalion of Fighting Marines and their equipment, were projected ashore and another unit was returned. It was also

during the Korean conflict that the first night helicopter troop lift in history was recorded.

It is fair to say that the bold and dedicated actions taken in this era of helicopter employment by all involved personnel caught the attention of senior officers at every level and spurred the development and procurement of more sophisticated rotary wing aircraft that were later made available for service in Vietnam and the Middle-East operations. Many of the missions in which those of you here are currently involved were conceived and developed by the Korean War Veterans we honor by this award.

Accepting the award on behalf of all those who served in naval helicopter operations in Korea is Commander Charley C. Jones, USN Ret. Charley is a pioneer Helicopter Pilot in the true sense of the word and holds helo designation # **229** dated April 21st, 1950 (49 years ago, today). He was a member of HU-1 which, during the period July 1950-July 1953, effected the rescue of 429 personnel, many under hostile fire. Charley has seen the rescue business from both sides. Following one rescue, his helo was so damaged by small arms fire that he was forced to ditch it in the Han River inside enemy territory. He and his crewman took to their life raft, paddled to an island in the middle of the river and were picked up by another HU-1 helicopter. Charley made a total of 20 rescues in Korea and was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross.

PIONEER AVIATOR:

Attending the 1999 NHA Symposium is CDR Edward Kubicki, USN, (ret). On July 26, 1946 CDR Kubicki became the 14th Naval Aviator to receive a helicopter designation. He is the last surviving Pilot Plank Owner of the Navy's first helicopter squadron, VX-3.

CDR Kubicki's career spanned a time in rotary wing history when "FIRSTS" were the order of the day. Events from his remarkable career include:

- FIRST helicopter flight in the Panama Canal Zone and FIRST helicopter flight to transit the Isthmus of Panama from Atlantic to Pacific on December 7, 1946.
- FIRST flight of a helicopter in the Antarctic in an HO-3S on January 10, 1947 during Operation High Jump.
- Participation in Operation Sandstone, the atomic tests at Eniwetok Atoll, ferrying "hot" samples in an HO-3S.
- FIRST helicopter flight and landing at Thule, Greenland during Operation Nanook, 1951.
- Project Officer for DASH, the Drone Anti-Submarine Helicopter Program 1959-1962.

CDR Kubicki retired in 1962. His contribution to Naval Rotary Wing Aviation is best summarized by an excerpt from his retirement letter, signed by ADM P.D. Stroop, Chief, Bureau of Naval Weapons: "Your fame and recognition as a helicopter pilot have become legend in the service and the number of successful rescue flights you have made over these twenty years of flying will always be a challenge to those who follow you."

<u>Note</u>: NHHS is particularly interested in locating and/or developing information on early Naval Helicopter Pilots.

NHHS Web Site Status:

DONOR GUIDELINES:

The Naval Helicopter Historical Society will accept for accession articles of technical, historical or artistic value for which it is able to provide storage, protection and preservation under conditions that insure availability for exhibition and study.

Examples include:

- 1. Historically significant helicopter aircraft in the form of (1) originals, (2) replicas, (3) reproductions, (4) restorations, and (5) mock-ups.
- 2. Ancillary helicopter aircraft equipment in the form of engines, rotor blades, instruments, wheels and tires, etc..
- 3. Helicopter aircraft models when and if they meet the professional standards of the Society's Master Modeler.
- Original and reproduction paintings of helicopter aviation in oils and watercolors. Also etchings and prints including posters and sculptures.

- Photographs and negatives of aviation articles, materials and significant helicopter events.
- 6. Helicopter clothing, uniforms, personal equipment, insignia and memorabilia.
- 7. Books, manuals and manuscripts in the form of collections or individual items.
- 8. Narratives and published articles that describe events and developments of significance or of general interest.

Documentation:

Each collectible shall be accompanied by documentation authenticating its source or origin including chronological dates, locations and responsible individuals.

Special Considerations:

Artifacts with less than complete data, but having artistic or technical merit may be accepted for accession if the curators are reasonably certain of their origin, content and the item's history can be established through scholarly research. It is important for both the research and exhibition functions of the Society to document changes and development in helicopter history and technology, therefore,

collection of recent and current work is also encouraged.

WE ARE READY TO ACCEPT DONATIONS.

Thank you for your response concerning the collection of helicopter artifacts and memorabilia. **Our accession system is now online** and we are ready to receive your historically significant donations.

FIRST, however, it is necessary that you:

- 1. List and photograph (if appropriate) the item(s) you have to donate.
- 2. Write a statement of their historical significance.
- 3. Provide the name and address of the owner of the item(s).
